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BRAC Overview

The Congress established the 2005 BRAC Commission to ensure the integrity of the base closure and realignment process. As directed by law, the Commission will provide an objective, non-partisan, and independent review and analysis of the list of military installation recommendations issued by the Department of Defense (DoD) on May 13, 2005. The recommendations provided by DoD are extremely complex and interrelated and will require in-depth analysis and careful attention to detail.



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BRAC Impacts on Virginia

- ❖ Affected 21 military installations
- ❖ Affected significant leased space in City of Alexandria, Counties of Arlington and Fairfax
- ❖ 130 separate actions
- ❖ Net gain in employment in Virginia
- ❖ More than \$5 billion in military construction (MILCON)
- ❖ Virginia becomes home to 3 of the 12 Joint Bases
- ❖ Actions must be completed by September 15, 2011

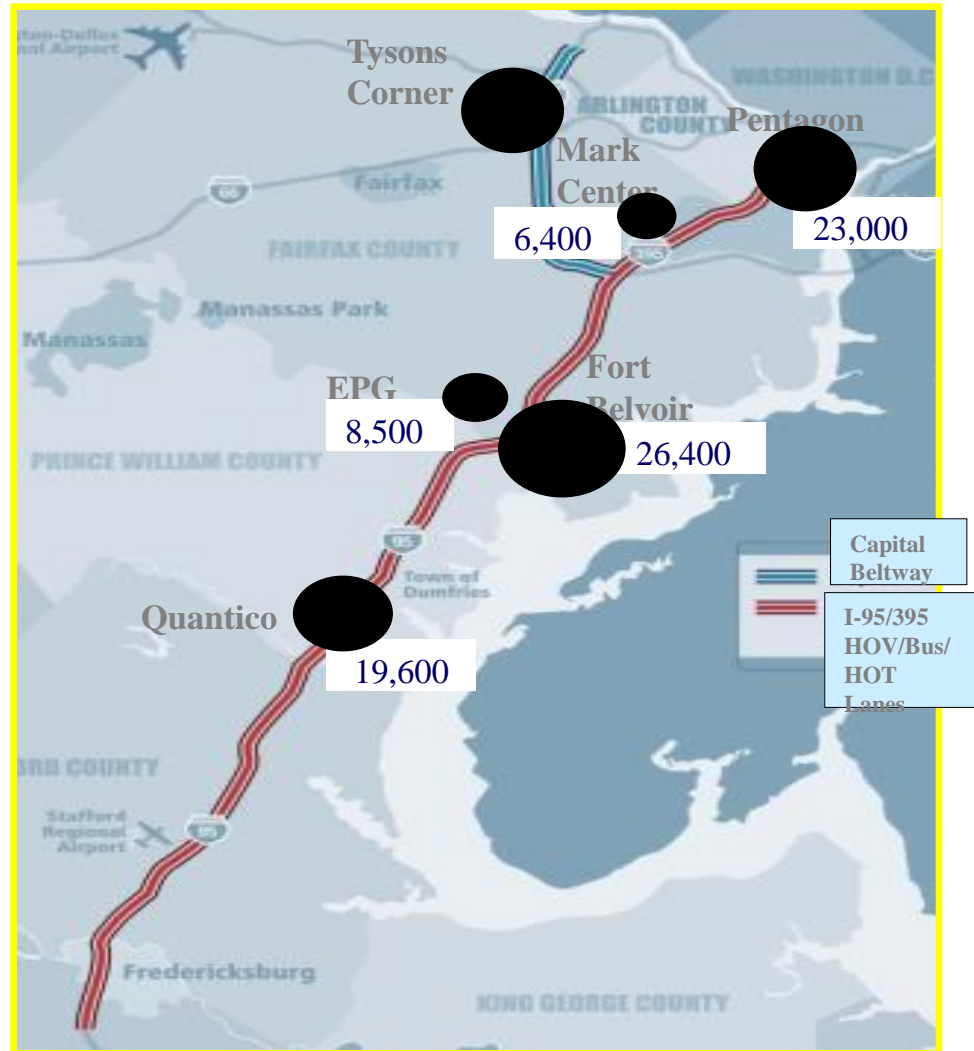
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The I-95/395 is an important and unique corridor because it serves current and future military bases.

It serves five military bases:

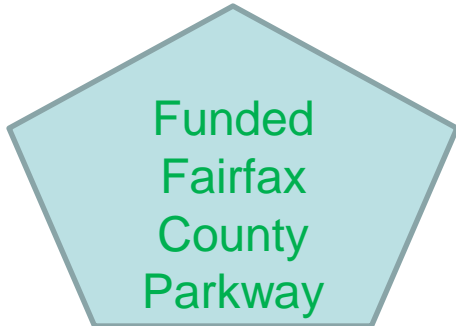
- Pentagon
- Mark Center at Seminary Road
- Fort Belvoir
- Engineering Proving Grounds
- Quantico

Combined they employ 84,000 people.



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Effects in the Commonwealth



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Department of Defense Efficiencies affecting Virginia:

- Disestablish portions of Joint Forces Command (JFCOM)
 - ❖ Command eliminated Aug 2011
 - ❖ Personnel moved Mar 2012
 - ❖ Virginia retained about 54% of work force (1,450 employees)
 - ❖ Dahlgren loss between 155 and 170
 - ❖ Hardest hit are contractors about 80% will loose jobs
 - ❖ 300 of the 1,400 military employees relocated



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Department of Defense Efficiencies affecting Virginia:

- Disestablish the headquarters of Second Fleet in Norfolk
- Cut the size of the staff support contractor cadre by 10% per year for three years
- Cancel the Marine Corps Expeditionary Fighting Vehicle
